TRIALS

Livingston- On November 16, 2011, before Judge Ray Chutz, a Jury of six convicted **James Clark**, 36, of Felony Battery of a Police Officer with Injury, said District Attorney Scott M. Perrilloux. Clark, of Denham Springs, LA, was arrested February 20, 2010 after an altercation with an officer from the Denham Springs Police Department. The victim and another officer were searching for a fugitive when they approached Clark and a group of others. The officers asked to see each person's license. As they were looking at the licenses, the defendant became loud and confrontational. Clark was then informed that if he continued that way, he would be arrested for Disturbing the Peace. At this time Clark made an aggressive movement toward the victim. In response, the officer utilized his taser. Clark then struck the victim once in the face, rendering him unconscious, injuring his occipital lobe, and breaking several bones, requiring hospitalization. In court, Clark claimed it was his brother who hit the officer, and that the police wrongly identified him. The jury deliberated for 10 minutes before returning with a guilty verdict.

Livingston- On November 8, 2011, before Judge Elizabeth Wolfe, a jury of six convicted **Richard McManus**, of Denham Springs, LA, of Possession of Schedule II Drugs. McManus was arrested on April 15, 2010 when he was pulled over by a Livingston Parish Sheriff's deputy for running a stop sign on South Satsuma and Perrilloux road. The arresting officer explained that as McManus removed his license from his wallet, he saw a small bag of what he identified as methamphetamine. McManus was then taken to a correctional facility and asked to empty his pockets. When he did, another small bag of methamphetamine was discovered. The jury deliberated for half an hour before returning with a guilty verdict.

NOTABLE CONVICTIONS

Amite- Delis Pierre, 36, was sentenced by Judge Bruce Bennett to 99 years with the Department of Corrections for Armed Robbery, 20 years for Second Degree Kidnapping, and 20 years for Purse Snatching.

Brian Registrar, 33, of Gayle Road Ponchatoula, LA, to 10 years with the Department of Corrections after he pleaded guilty to Production and Manufacture of Methamphetamine, and Simple Burglary

Antonio Holden, 20, of Pine Grove, LA, and Fredrick Conley, 27, of Independence, LA, were sentenced to 10 years with the Department of Corrections for Armed Robbery.

Ykeith Felder, 40, of 510 E. Robinson, Hammond, LA, pleaded no contest to two counts of Second Degree Battery. Judge Robert Morrison sentenced Felder to five (5) years with the Department of Corrections for each count, to be served consecutively for a total of 10 years.

Kip McDonald, 29, of 31208 Horseshoe Road, Independence, LA, was sentenced to 10 years with the Department of Corrections for Production and Manufacture of Schedule II Drugs.

Alvin Henderson, 47, of Hammond, LA, was sentenced to serve 10 years with the Department of Corrections for Creation/Operation of a Clandestine Laboratory, and Manufacture of Methamphetamine.
